
Directions

Possible route between the two Preedy churches in the Bromyard deanery, starting and ending in the town of Bromyard.






The Trail

We have curated a trail of the two churches in the Bromyard area that have features designed and made by Frederick Preedy. The suggested route starts and ends in Bromyard, where you will find plenty of restaurants and coffee shops to fuel you on your church crawl. These churches are both in rural Herefordshire and demonstrate that Frederick Preedy took a range of commissions, and didn't just focus on grand town churches.





Preedy Trail




Upper Sapey St Michael and All Angels



This is a grade II* listed building dating from the 12th century. Although the church was restored from 1859 to 1860, Preedy was not involved in the rebuilding. However, the three-light east window from 1860 is considered a Preedy window. This window depicts scenes from the Resurrection of Christ.

Whitbourne St John the Baptist

This grade II* listed building dates from the late 12th and 13th centuries. There is a lot of stained glass in this church, but the one designed by Preedy is the chancel northwest window. This window depicts Jacob weeping for Joseph, with the text taken from Genesis 37:35. You may be familiar with Joseph and his coat of many colours, which Jacob is pictured holding.



Other Trails

In addition to this trail, we have also created trails starting in Ledbury, Ross, and Much Wenlock.
