Liturgical provision for the Commemoration of Thomas Traherne, 10th October

Commemorations are not provided with liturgical propers in the Church of England and are normally kept by a mention in prayers of intercession and thanksgiving. However, "A Commemoration may be observed as a Lesser Festival, with liturgical provision from the common material for holy men and women, ... where there is an established celebration in the wider church or where the day has a special local significance." Also, "diocesan and other local provision may be made to supplement the national Calendar." The material gathered here is offered to encourage the joyful keeping of the Commemoration especially in this the 350th anniversary year of his death.

About Traherne

Thomas Traherne was born in Hereford in about 1637, son of a shoemaker. After education in Hereford and Oxford in the Puritan years he was appointed the living of Credenhill, receiving episcopal ordination at the Restoration. His poems and meditations composed there, rediscovered in recent years, have established him as a major Angican spiritual writer. His other writing, and the trials of the Civil War, show that he was no stranger to the seriousness of sin and suffering, but he was also exceptionally aware of the wonder and glory of creation, and his resolve was to draw deeply on the love and grace of God and seek the felicity that can bring. THOMAS TRAHERNE c1636-74

Hereford's poet of ecstasy & inclusion

THE STAINED GLASS WINDOWS in the Audley Chapel at Hereford Cathedral (by Tom Denny, 2007) commemorate the life of one of the city's greatest sons, whose prose and poetry have made a huge contribution to the life and spirituality of many, not least in recent years. The windows depict four key parts of Thomas Traherne's life: first, his love of the city of Hereford: he was born here in about 1636, and baptised in All Saints' Church. Denny depicts a scene: "The city seemed to stand in Eden, or to be built in Heaven. The streets were mine, the temple was mine, the people were mine." Traherne returned to Hereford and became incumbent at Credenhill. 'The little church is seen in the second window, which has an image of Traherne himself, bathed in light, the River Wye snaking into the distance. This scene, for Denny, was inspired by Traherne's lovely phrase "You are as prone to love as the sun to shine". The third light of the window shows a cross 'set on fire with invisible flame — the flame is love', a reminder of Traherne's emphasis on the inclusive love of Christ. Finally, in the fourth light, we see the poet running through a cornfield, which recalls his oft-quoted phrase, "The corn was orient and immortal wheat which never should be reaped nor was ever sown, a lovely image of Traherne's delight in the created world. Traherne published very little during his lifetime; many of his manuscripts were not signed, and they were lost until a chance purchase in 1896 led to the publication of some of his poems and the Centuries. Further unpublished manuscripts were identified as recently as 1997. Traherne moved to London in 1672 as chaplain to Sir Orlando Bridgeman. There he died in 1674 and was buried on this day in the chancel of St Mary's Church, Teddington.
