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Come Holy Spirit

Dear Friends

May marks the end of the Easter season and the beginning of what is affectionately known as 'ordinary time' in the Church calendar. The pivot happens at the feast of Pentecost, on May 19th this year. Every Sunday is always a celebration of the resurrection, so it's hard to see what is ordinary about it. The events of the Christ's death and resurrection are the turning point of history. It is a worldshattering event that means life can never be the same again. The book of Acts tells us how the disciples' lives were turned upside down by it. In their grief at the loss of Jesus a number were considering returning to their previous occupations. Once they encountered the risen Lord, they decided to change the world instead!

However, it was not just historical events which changed things. It was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Christian faith has always been a supernatural one. In the struggles to fill rotas, find volunteers, maintain buildings and serve our

communities we can easily forget this. If the Christian life was just a set of rules to obey, religious acts to observe and an institution to maintain, it would not have lasted very long.

Trusting in the Holy Spirit to empower and lead is less safe than seeking to control events ourselves. Periodically in the history of the Church the Holy Spirit has broken through in ways that have upended our conventional way of doing things. It happened in the Wesleyan revival of the 18th century, numerous mini revivals in the church (of which some happened in our diocese) and in the great outpouring in Azusa Street in 1906 that gave birth to Pentecostalism. This is now the third largest stream in the Church today. In many ways it is hard to see how our current institutional predicament can be served by strategic thinking alone. I am praying for another (likely messy!) outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Diocese of Hereford. Only the Holy Spirit can give us the courage we need

Praying outside the box

Something is happening in the tiny rural border settlement of Marton, in sight of Offa's Dyke, south of Shrewsbury. 'The Gathering' is an 'evening of praising and worshipping God,' through contemporary evangelical music and blessing one another. That may not sound all that unusual, but this meeting is attracting new, younger Christians, from across the ecumenical spectrum to this tiny hamlet.

For some, the key attraction seems to be as simple as moving worship outside the walls of the church. Revd. David Moss, Rector for the Parishes of Westbury, Worthen and Yockleton, reminds us, "Jesus rarely spent time in synagogues or the Temple in Jerusalem. In fact, he preferred to 'meet people exactly where

they were' both spiritually and physically...at a local well, on the side of a mountain and beside the Sea of Galilee. That's something the people loved about him and why so many would come out to meet him, pressing against him to try and get closer. In that same way, Jesus meets us where we are.... Even in Marton!"

Rev'd David is encouraged that faith seems to be moving infectiously through the assembled group: "When we meet each month, many people get up and share what God is doing in their life or their village; the testimonies that are shared are amazing. A God who still heals physically today; a God who has rescued people in otherwise impossible situations; a God who loves us, right where we are... As St Paul says in his letter to the church in Corinth, 'What is the outcome then, brothers? When you assemble, each one has a psalm, has a teaching, has a revelation, has a tongue, has a translation."

The group meets monthly on the last Tuesday of the month in the Village Hall.

Cathedral hosts Chrism Eucharist

The annual Chrism Eucharist took place in March at Hereford Cathedral. Clergy and lay ministers gathered from around the diocese for the service in which by tradition they renew their commitment to ministry and where three different oils used in sacraments throughout the year are blessed and distributed to the

assembled clergy by the Bishop.

The oils of baptism, unction and chrism were blessed before the main altar in the presence of the Bishop of Hereford, the Dean of Hereford, Assistant Bishops, Archdeacons, Deacons, Rural Deans, Prebendaries, Canons, Chapter Officers, Vergers of the Cathedral and other clergy and staff. Chrism is used at the ordination of priests and bishops, baptism, confirmation, the coronation of kings and queens, the consecration of altars and the blessing of churches. As part of the consecration, balsam was poured into the chrism oil, which gives it a sweet fragrance described as the "odour of sanctity".

The *Fairtrade* communion wine and organic extra virgin olive oil distributed was from the Holy Land.
