### Working for yourself



You may decide that you have the professional skills and knowledge that mean you would like to set up your own business and work for yourself. If you decide to do this, in the UK you will classed as being 'self-employed' or a 'sole trader' - even if you have not yet told HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC). If you decide to start trading on a self-employed basis, it is very important that you register with HMRC and follow their online advice. It is recommended that you speak to an accountant who will help you with a basic understanding of what records you will need to keep and what and when you will need to report to HMRC.

In addition, you might like to speak to someone in the Economic Development Team of the local authority for advice. There are lots of useful web links to explore.

### Running a business

You're probably self-employed if you:

- run your business for yourself and take responsibility for its success or failure
- have several customers at the same time
- can decide how, where and when you do your work
- can hire other people at your own expense to help you or to do the work for you
- provide the main items of equipment to do your work
- are responsible for finishing any unsatisfactory work in your own time
- charge an agreed fixed price for your work
- sell goods or services to make a profit

The tax year in the UK runs from 6<sup>th</sup> April to 5<sup>th</sup> April and any tax owing is usually paid in arrears. You'll need to register by **5 October** following the end of the tax year (5 April) that you started working for yourself or earned more than £1,000.

#### For example:

You are paid £2,000 during the tax year that ends on 5 April 2023. The deadline to let HMRC know you are working for yourself is 5 October 2023. Any tax due for that year would need to be paid in the following year – in this case during 2024.

### £1,000 Trading Income Allowance

The trading income allowance lets UK individuals earn up to £1,000 tax-free every tax year without letting HMRC know about their income.

It simplifies the tax system for individuals because it means they:

- Don't need to tell HMRC about this income;
- Avoid the need to register as self-employed with HMRC and fill out a tax return;

Can earn it tax-free and in some cases, alongside their personal allowance.

It is great for individuals who want to test an idea out before they set up a business or have an opportunity to do a small amount of work outside of your main employment. However, once you exceed this amount you will be liable for tax on any amount over £1000 and you must declare it.

## Your responsibilities if you decide to become 'Self-Employed'.

The first thing you will need to do is <u>apply for a National Insurance number</u> if you've moved to the UK and want to set up a business. You will need this to register with HMRC, so do this first.

#### You'll need to:

- keep business records and records of expenses
- send a <u>Self Assessment tax return</u> every year
- pay <u>Income Tax</u> on your profits and <u>Class 2 and Class 4 National Insurance</u> use <u>HMRC's calculator</u> to help you budget for this

#### **VAT**

You must <u>register for VAT</u> if your turnover is over £90,000. You can register voluntarily if it suits your business, for example if you sell to other VAT-registered businesses and want to reclaim the VAT.

#### Working in the construction industry

Register with HMRC for the <u>Construction Industry Scheme</u> (CIS) if you're working in the construction industry as a subcontractor or contractor.

### How to Register as Self-Employed in the UK?

Registering is simple enough to do yourself online via a .GOV tax account.

## **Useful Information for Registration**

Before you start filling in the form online, here's some of the information you'll need to have ready:

- Name
- Date of Birth
- UK Address
- National Insurance Number
- Telephone number
- Email address
- Business start date
- A brief description of what you do
- Driving licence
- Passport
- Payslips or P60

### 1: Visit the HMRC Website








### 2: Set Up a Government Gateway Account











Set up a government gateway account – this is where you'll manage your self-employment taxes and find important forms like your tax overview. HMRC will automatically generate a 12-digit number that you'll use as your login.

#### 3: Enrol for Self Assessment

Complete the HMRC form to register for HMRC taxes. You'll need to share your personal information, details about the work you will do once you are set up as self-employed and make a declaration that everything you have entered is true.



### 4: Get your UTR number

HMRC will review your application once you submit it. Within the next 10 days, they'll send you a UTR number to be posted to you (can take up to 10 days). You may be able to find it sooner on the HMRC app or inside your online tax account.

It's a 10-digit ID number that you'll need to keep safe in the event you need to prove you are a sole trader, speak with HMRC and manage your self-employed taxes.

### 5: Use Your Activation Code

Finally, you'll also be sent an activation code for your government gateway account as part of the verification process. It can take up to 28 days for this to be sent but <u>make sure you enter it as soon as you receive it because it will expire and you won't be able to access important features like filing your tax return</u>.
